Kodak Ultra Mini Portable Projector

Digital projectors, with enough power to throw a 50 or 60 inch display from 14 feet away, are getting quite small. Gemini by Google Reads Out Texts, and more

This **Gizmodo** article follows a trail of evidence showing that Google's Gemini will continue to gather user data, including personal messages, in order to enhance AI driven personal assistants (**agentic AI**). **It can't be turned off!** If Google did not poke into personal messages, voice recordings, location followings, it would be unable to train your smart personal assistant (or **agentic AI**, as they call it). For some early users, who also own a large library of photos, Google uses AI to classify images as to content. This enables a new service called, "**Ask Photos**". The, requesting Gemini for a type of photo, like "all with pets" or "best photos for my phone background", will bring up all images suitable to that query (*from your personal photos only*).

Super Cook

Click or type, to add the ingredients in your fridge or pantry, and get recipes that use just those items; this saves on waste. The app assumes you have salt, pepper and water. Since I had a lot of items in my list, it returned almost four thousand recipes.

Go Wireless, for Listening

Cut the cord, while improving the sound, with a small device that plugs into any standard audio out port. The **AirFly** transmitter sends out blue-tooth audio to Apple air pods, or most any ear pods or headsets that accept blue-tooth. **AirFly** also claims to improve the listening experience on flights. [\$60CAD, or the cheaper \$40 version]

ClearClick VHS2DVD

<u>ClearClick</u> sells many digital converters. Most are more expensive than <u>NHS2DVD</u> for digitizing video tapes. (As far as I know, the accompanying software does not copy commercial tapes with digital rights content.)
[I have found that software downloads for one brand of digitizer may also work for off brand hardware... some hardware as low as \$30CAD.]

In any case, the *mpeg* files created do not have to be placed on a DVD; they can be copied to thumb drives. Old family videos can then be passed along to descendants. [\$70USD] **ClearClick** upscalers will cost more.

Video Game Treats ADHD

EndeavorRx is the name of a game that seems to help children with **ADHD** (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder) especially those on the hyperactivity side. **Akili** promotes this game.

Game difficulty adjusts automatically. The content and style of the game was designed by neuroscientists. This has prompted mental health researchers to employ games diagnostically, possibly for treating patients who subscribe to **thymia AI**. Thymia diagnoses not only ADHD, but many other disorders, suffered by billions of people... depression being the major disorder scored by the app. https://thymia.ai/

CabinPulse Remote Monitoring

This Canadian remote monitoring device can work on just about any cell provider's signal, as low as one bar, to deliver messages about temperature, air quality, humidity, and poqwe outages, when set up in a remote location. Should main power fail, the battery back up lasts three days. Should cottage temperature fall below freezing, a **CabinPulse** warning text message allows the owner to take action. Should the **CabinPulse** 'hear' the sound of a smoke detector, it will send an alert, within five minutes. Bluetooth is included for future upgrades to more nearby sensors, yet to be developed. [\$199 CAD with a \$14/mo CAD service fee – coverage is most of Canada, US, Mexico] https://cabinpulse.com/

Sideclick remote

The **Sideclick** fits snugly onto a Firestick TV remote, or an Apple TV remote, taking the place of all other remotes for sound bar and TV control.

Oukitel RT3

Sometimes I run across a 'new' brand name. This one, **Outkitel**, makes phones – some of them ruggedized. But, the **Oukitel RT3 model** is both a phone and an 8-inch, tablet – similar to an iPad, in that it has touch, cameras front and back, expansion ports, and it can take up to two phone SIMs. Sure, Android 12 is not the latest version of the Android OS, nor is the CPU as strong as in expensive smart phones, nor do the cameras match specs of the newest smart pones. Still, the **RT3** gives 'bang for the buck'. With a \$190USD price, this may explain why it is out of stock on the company's web site. Amazon may still have a few. Oukitel RT3 – OUKITEL

WiFi7 is Proving Faster

The above is a qualified statement, depending on a lot of "**ifs**". Among those ifs; Do you have a WiFi7 router? Do you have fast Internet? Do you have a computer that can be updated to WiFi7? Is it worth the cost? Routers, with WiFi7, are becoming more prevalent (starting at about \$170CAD) So is high speed Internet. WiFi7 PCI boards start at about \$60CAD for desktops. Laptops present a bigger challenge, as only some newer laptops contain a WiFi7 card. Those that came with a **WiFi6e M.2** card can be upgraded to a **WiFi7 M.2** card quite easily (for about \$125CAD), as shown in the following link. Computational Chemistry

Microsoft Research has made gains in predicting theoretical effects of more complex chemical compounds (yet to be made in the lab) through computational 'thinking'. Moving up, from predicting simpler, less complex, reactions, to the level of complex chemistry (as in organic chemistry for medicine) has been the bane of older super computers, until machine learning came along.

Caltech developers have made a small sensory capsule that you swallow. As it passes through the alimentary canal, measurements are recorded relative to gut health, as well as to overall health: items like acidity, glucose levels, temperature, and serotonin. This removes the need for biopsies, in some cases. A single PillTrek is 25 millimetres long, and powered by a couple of small button batteries. [Camera pills have already been in use, to perform endoscopies.]

For this month, I have two things I want to discuss on the topic of taking back control of the computers we paid for.

The first has to do with Ad Blockers and YouTube. I was noticing an increasing number of times that YouTube would pop up an annoying message about sluggish performance and a link to a web page that blamed ad blockers. It seems that the slow down is being caused by the pop-up message and is a deliberate action taken by Google. I am not sure if this is just a Chrome thing or if other browsers are affected. In any case, I have a partial fix to this attack.

In Chrome:

- Click on the three dots menu and select Settings.
- In Settings select Privacy and security.
- Select Site settings
- Select View permissions and data stored across sites
- Find YouTube and click
- Find www.YouTube.com and click
- Find the setting for Notifications and select Block
- Exit settings and close Chrome (to allow the settings to "take")

This fix "mostly" works. It seems that the message will sometimes appear, but it's mostly associated with actual rather than fake slow-downs.

Secondly: The other thing I find exciting is a tool called "Flyby11" that allows most computers to run Windows 11. I need to study this more, but the software can be found at:

If you have a spare old PC you are not using why not experiment with a Linux distro.

I have two old computers that at one time ran versions of Windows.

Windows 10 was on an old desktop PC [Pentium class] that was not being used.

Windows 11 was preinstalled on a small Beelink mini pc [Celeron N100] that I purchased from Amazon for about \$200.

Now I use both machines to test different Linux distro.

Windows 10 was replaced with Manjaro Gnome so I could see what Gnome offered as a desktop.

Windows 11 on the Mini PC was replaced by CachyOS using KDE. Cachy OS is still being tested by me.

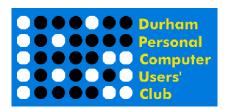
